ISS Speaker- Wesley Riley

Speaker went through introduction slides on:

Alex Coughlan (Disability Rights Officer)

Programmes (at the end of Semester 1) ran during study week, that's why the attendance rate was low.

Programmes should not be calendared during the study week or winter period.

Kelsey Bruce (1MS1 Regenerative Medicine)

The Office 365 Workshop ss probably too late in the term, it is needed long before week 5.

Rose Hymes (Gaeilge)

The 'Wifi Workshop' programme sounds very general, there is not enough information, there should be a more specific name/description.



Maybe advertisement could have been boosted by including it into the library tour, etc.

Joseph (1st Year Engineering)

It would be great to have a session during orientation days, perhaps separate sessions, each session in each college or school for new students.

Laura (Postgraduate Community Development Practice)

For adult learners, something very early on would be helpful as most adult students, about 80 percent of class had difficulties with PC use. It would be good to have a session early on the semester as lot of people struggled.

Ciaran (1st Year General Nursing)

Asked about the setting and location of the help centre and Wifi Clinic. → Answered.

<u>Ciaran (1st Year General Nursing)</u>

NUIG has a large campus. From an Aras Moyola based student's perspective, if you were to have one more location on campus you would get a lot more engagement. At a more central location like the Concourse, which is more convenient for students.

Rose (Gaeilge)

Did you say an hr and a half talk? Because that might be too long for students (time commitment and attention span wise) so shorter, more compact, 30 min long talks would be better.

Leah (4th Year Soc and Pol)

Perhaps even something as simple as setting up some space and a desk outside of Smokey's could be very useful as it is a more approachable space.

Michelle (Unknown)

PhD students come in at August (before everyone else) and there are a lot of students who have technological difficulties...Having a space or room booked on the concourse for the ISS where students could pop into with their issues would be very-very helpful.

Benjamin Moor (First Year Engineering)

They had a sex education talk for 10 mins during one of the engineering lectures earlier during the year. Catching students by walking into a lecture is a good way to connect and get students to listen, as most of the year would be attending and there would be a large audience of students.

You would be able to attend, but it's a large campus, so you need to make sure to visit all sides of campus and make sessions as short as possible to get more and better student engagement.



Alex Coughlan (Disability Rights Officer)

Highlighted software accessibility issues. Software and applications like Dragon are only accessible in particular computer suites on campus. Has contacted relevant people before about the issue but it has not been resolved. Is there anyone particular who could be contacted to further pursue finding a solution to this issue?

Anti-Deportation Stance

Brandon Walsh (Welfare and Equality Officer)

NUIG is now officially designated University of Sanctuary. Discussion of possibility to start a motion.

Riam M. (Final Year Soc and Pol)

Will this motion cover students only or staff as well?

→Answered by Brandon Walsh (Welfare and Equality Officer): Students (the Students Union's primary focus is on students) ...Not sure about staff, will can look into it.

Alex Coughlan (Disability Rights Officer)

Deportation orders might affect students in other ways too even if it is not directly them who are facing deportation, deportation orders might affect students through their spouse, parents, family, etc.

Staff should also be included.

Oissine Moore (Societies Chairperson)

Can we know under what stance were the deportation orders issued?

→ Answered by USI Speaker Marie:

They were registered students, entered the country legally, etc. Deportation order for one of the students was issued because some documentation arrived late.

Other issues and reasons for deportation orders are more dependent on the actual situation, case-to-case basis. Speaker will research it and come back with more information next time.

Joseph (1st Year Engineering)

What about cases where there is a proper, serious reason (crime etc.) for the deportation order? Would the SU still strive to protect the student and offer support?

Are there any disqualifying circumstances that could be put in place at a later stage?

→ Answered by Cameron Keighron (Education Officer):

We have no say in criminal proceedings, and regardless, if they are still a member of the SU, they are entitled to the support of the Students Union just as equally as any other student.

<u>Unknown (Final Year Biochemistry)</u>

Unknown.

→ Answered by Alex Coughlan (Disability Rights Officer)

To qualify for protection as an asylum seeker, you have to enter the country legally. (Hence if you are an asylum seeker, you can not be an 'illegal immigrant'...)



Erin Mac An Tsaoir (Oifigeach Na Gaeilge)

Are there concrete requirements for someone to enter this programme? Do we say that we stand by the student until the degree is finished?

Benjamin Moore (First Year Engineering)

Inquired if anyone knows how much the subsidised fees and funding provided by the government total to...

In relation to students having to move out of Ireland after doing their degree...If after receiving the support, subsidies and funding from the government, these international graduates are required to leave the country upon the completion of their studies, the costs and burden fall on us and the Irish economy.

What are the council's views on this?

Brandon Walsh (Vice-President / Welfare & Equality Officer)

Yes, after their education is completed, they will likely be deported and be asked to leave the country.

He is unsure of the costs incurred, the exact effect on the economy and the amount of subsidies provided by the government per student.

Cameron Keighron (Education Officer)

The motion cannot and will not do anything with the issuing of deportations. Again, we have 0 control over this.

Brandon Walsh (Vice-President / Welfare & Equality Officer)

The proposed motion would not apply to Alumni, only current registered students.

Avery Fenton (International Students' Officer)

Would like to point out that fees are not subsidised by the government for most international students, they often must pay even more compared to EU students.

The deportation order (in link to previously mentioned case) was issued because of documentation and paperwork -and often is with many deportation cases- and not due to illegal entry or criminal activity...

Cameron Keighron (Education Officer)

We are one of the Designated Universities of Sanctuary. The Union fully supports and welcomes the integration of students and asylum seekers entering our community and aims towards providing them with help.

Ciaran (1st Year General Nursing)

As a general nursing student, as graduates many of us will be in the unfortunate situation of having to leave the country anyways...Focus should be on keeping the workforce in the country...Everyone should support and promote the motion....



Scott Green (SU Council Chairperson)

Just to clarify again, there is no concrete motion on the table, we are discussing the possibility of bringing such motion in. We are not debating content for now.
